Your Children's Hospital

The Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario is a health care centre dedicated to providing comprehensive care to children and young people in Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec. Founded in 1974, CHEO offers a range of medical services for patients from birth through 18 years of age.



The Hospital receives 8,600 inpatient admissions each year, and its outpatient programs handle more than 200,000 patient visits annually. The Emergency Department handles on average 135 visits per day. The Hospital also provides a Health Information Line for parents and teenagers answered promptly by specially trained CHEO Registered Nurses.

There are approximately 380 physicians and dentists, a nursing staff of approximately 600, more than 1,200 full/part time employees and 600 volunteers.

CHEO is the primary paediatric teaching hospital of the University of Ottawa Faculty of Medicine. Through the work of its newly opened Research Institute CHEO maintains a growing reputation for major research into diseases and health problems afflicting children including muscular dystrophy, spinal muscular atrophy, pain, hamburger disease, cystic fibrosis, teenage suicide, and new drug therapies.

Some of the Hospital's most widely recognized programs and facilities include:

- the Ontario Regional Poison Information Centre extending 24-hour emergency assistance
- a regional centre of paediatric cardiovascular surgery
- a 10-bed Paediatric Intensive Care Unit
- a 20-bed Neonatal Intensive Care Unit for treatment of critically ill newborns
- a major centre for the surgical repair of cleft palates
- a 24-hour emergency Psychiatric assistance team linked with inpatient and day programs
- an internationally recognized program for hearing impaired and deaf children, including those with cochlear implants
- the newly opened CHEO Research Institute as the major paediatric research organization in Eastern Ontario
- a Medical Day Unit providing complex treatments for a variety of programs including oncology, and monitoring on an outpatient basis without hospitalization
- a Kidney Dialysis Unit
- a Teen Health Centre offering a broad range of clinical youth services and support programs
- a respected Infectious Diseases program for inpatient and outpatient care of such serious illnesses as cystic fibrosis, immunological deficiency (including HIV), and tuberculosis
- an expanding Day Care Surgery Unit, minimizing parent-child separations for many surgical procedures
- regional programs for both Neonatal Genetics and Virology

Your Support

Long before the Hospital existed, a group of concerned citizens organized to raise funds for a bilingual Hospital that was dedicated to the needs of children.

By 1972, this committee had raised more than \$4 million. In 1974, CHEO opened its doors, thanks in large part to their fund-raising efforts. The same year, the Children's Hospital Foundation was incorporated.

The mission of the Foundation is "to further the physical, mental and social well-being of children and their families in Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec by raising, managing and disbursing funds."

The Foundation raises funds by soliciting and receiving donations, bequests, insurance policies and grants, and by organizing special events and lotteries.



Throughout the year, approximately 150 special events are held on behalf of CHEO. These range from the Remont Farms Corn Roast to the Polar Bear Dip and include events as widely known as Le Tour des Quickie, the Kiwanis Duck Race for Tiny Hearts, and Charithon softball marathon. A consistent aim of the Foundation is to keep special events as family oriented as possible.

The Foundation also organizes several mega lotteries including CHEO's Dream of a Lifetime featuring close to \$1 million in prizes. In six years, Dream of a Lifetime has raised more than \$5 million for the Children's Hospital. In 1996, CHEO partnered with the Queensway-Carleton Hospital and the Ottawa-Carleton Regional Police Association

to present the Big Ticket Sweepstakes. This joint venture proved successful for both hospitals raising \$400,000 for each. The Foundation's main event is the CJOH Telethon for CHEO. Our Telethon is part of the North America wide Children's Miracle Network. Several patients from CHEO have appeared on the continent-wide broadcast All funds raised locally benefit CHEO. It is estimated that more than 1,000 volunteers are required to mount the Telethon and the many activities that take place throughout Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec during the weekend.

Funds raised throughout the year by the Foundation help support:

- Research Projects
- Fellowships
- Equipment Replacement
- Enhancements to the paediatric nature of the Hospital
- Staff training
- Family Emergency Needs

Foundation funding helps pay for extras, over and above the Hospital's core operating budget provided by the Ontario Ministry of Health. It helps the Hospital to create a more child-friendly environment essential for a paediatric facility.

Message from the Chair

My first year as chair of the board of directors of the Children's Hospital Foundation was exciting, challenging and fulfilling.

Two new lotteries were organized in 1996. The Big Ticket Sweepstakes was developed in partnership with the Queensway-Carleton Hospital Foundation and the Ottawa-Carleton Regional Police Association. Both collaborators were great to work with and The Big Ticket was a huge success for all of us.

The Great Corel Draw for CHEO was presented on our behalf by one of this area's most generous corporations, Corel. This lottery's success can be measured not only in the funds it raised but also by the new and younger supporters it attracted to our Hospital.

As a board, we were satisfied with the results achieved this year. As well as raising additional funds from both lotteries, we received strong support during the Telethon and benefitted from an individual gift of \$100,000 made at year's end.

In total, the Foundation raised \$5.1 million net of expenses. From this we transferred \$2.5 million to the Hospital. Additional monies were contributed to our three endowment funds and directed to supporting research at CHEO.

The pressure to transfer more money to the Hospital keeps growing each year because of continued government cutbacks. Although the Restructuring Commission did not change the Hospital's basic mandate when it released its report in February, it did add additional services and beds to the Hospital without increasing its budget. The expectation to "do more with less" continues to hold true for CHEO and we as a Foundation feel compelled to help lessen the load.

While searching for new ways to help the Hospital cope with its financial constraints, we have seen how successful partnerships can be. We are committed to exploring other opportunities to forge additional strategic alliances.

As the eyes and ears of the community, we as a board take very seriously the trust people put in us when they contribute to the Foundation. We are always looking at how we raise money, and how much it costs us to do so. The Foundation board is very proud of the successes that our organization has enjoyed with lotteries, all of which have been operated by our own staff. By operating this way, we have been able to lower our operating expenses.

1997 will be another year full of challenges. I am confident that both the board and the staff of the Foundation will confront these challenges head on. Both groups are motivated by their eagerness to help our sick children.

Thank you to my fellow board members and to the staff for the work you did in 1996. The Foundation's ability to help so many children is the result of your personal dedication and strong commitment.

1996 Year in Review

1996 was a year categorized by new partnerships and continued growth. In late January, the CHEO Foundation joined forces with the Queensway-Carleton Hospital Foundation and the Ottawa-Carleton Regional Police Association to present the Big Ticket Sweepstakes.

When the prizes were drawn on March 24, just over 17,000 tickets had been sold at \$100 per ticket. Each hospital received \$400,000 from the Big Ticket Sweepstakes. CHEO has earmarked the money to purchase specialized neurosurgery equipment called stereotactic equipment. This state-of-the-art technology works with the magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) to assist surgeons in planning and performing the eradication of brain tumours.

The spring was its usual busy period. The sixth annual Le Tour des Quickie took place on May 5 attracting more than 10,000 participants. CHEO received \$231,000 from Le Tour bringing its cumulative total to well over \$1.7 million.

On the following weekend, 96,000 ducks took to the canal for the ninth annual Kiwanis Duck Race for Tiny Hearts. Not rain, nor sleet, nor snow or wind could stop this event from being a success. Although the crowds stayed away, the ducks still came through raising \$250,000 for CHEO.

As soon as the ducks were out of the water, "Show Your Bear" fever began sweeping the region in anticipation of the CJOH Telethon for CHEO. As has been the case each year since 1984, the people of Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec showed they care deeply about their children's hospital. The June 1 & 2 Telethon raised \$2.3 million. More than \$1 million was pledged by individuals. Every kind of special event imaginable helped to raise the rest. Service clubs, companies, organizations and individuals held events as diverse as Chess in the Park to the annual Sweetheart Dance. Raising money to help sick children continues to be a powerful motivator. Thousands of people volunteer each year resulting in more than 150 events benefitting CHEO each year.

Working with the Corel Corporation, the Foundation continued its busy pace during the summer months by staging the Great Corel Draw for CHEO. As if offering one Porsche 911 wasn't enough of a prize, the Great Corel Draw featured a first prize of two Porsches. It also included fabulous vacations to see world-class tennis and bobsleigh events in exotic locations like Monaco, Paris, and Melbourne.

The winners were announced during the Corel World Gala held at, were else, the Corel Centre. Earlier that day, Corel had presented CHEO with a cheque for \$70,000. The Hike for CHEO was kicked off in early September and it seemed to signal the end of summer. The month rushed by and the Hike took place in October. Backed by strong corporate sponsorship and carried by the enthusiasm of the Greek community, the Hike raised \$22,500.

CHEO's Dream of a Lifetime lottery was launched in October. The \$1-million prize board included two houses and several cars, as well as furniture, vacations and jewellery. The 1996 dream child was a little girl named Billie Jo Decarie. Billie Jo contracted AIDS from her mother who had received the deadly HIV virus through a blood transfusion. Throughout the campaign, Billie Jo's smiling face on all of the posters help remind everyone why we are raising money.

As a result of another successful Dream of a Lifetime lottery, CHEO raised close to \$1 million. This money will help the Hospital care for thousands of children, many like Billie Jo, who show a courage that is well beyond their years. Throughout the year, the Hospital received bequests from generous individuals who had made provisions to support CHEO through their last will and testament. Planned gifts are extremely important to the Hospital because they allow us to grow our endowment funds, crucial to the Hospital's long-term stability.

During the year, thousands of people show they care for their Children's Hospital by contributing time, money, and resources in support of our fund-raising activities. Each and everyone of these people: donors, lottery buyers, special event organizers, planned givers, volunteers, and corporate sponsors, should be proud of the contributions they have made. They have all made a difference in the lives of thousands of our children.
