Support from our community enabled us to invest nearly \$700,000 to upgrade the patient rooms with fresh paint, new flooring, new washrooms including; hands-free sinks, new furniture, televisions and window coverings to provide a much improved décor. This project also included the renovation of the playroom and the addition of new, fun features to make a child's stay in hospital more tolerable for the entire family.

This past year we introduced our legacy giving program called "Forever CHEO" which enables donors to help future generations of children and families who will need to rely on CHEO. Donors making a gift to CHEO in their estates will have the option to have the full amount of their gift preserved with the interest going to CHEO annually. Donors can take pride in knowing that their hard-earned life savings will be preserved in perpetuity within the "Forever CHEO" endowment fund and interest from their gift will benefit CHEO patients each and every year... forever. It is a deeply meaningful way to ensure your love for children lives on and that CHEO remains strong for future generations.

INFORMATION AT YOUR FINGERTIPS

In the fall we were excited to "go live" with the first phase of our electronic health records, known as Epic. This was a massive undertaking necessitating, for example, the conversion of two million laboratory records. This is part of an even bigger project to convert the entire hospital to a single paperless system – a best practice successfully implemented by such respected hospitals as Cleveland Clinic, Johns Hopkins and The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia

Epic improves the patient experience, better connects care and puts powerful tools in the hands of our providers. For example, test results will be available more quickly and patient appointments can be better coordinated (eliminating multiple trips). Eventually, families will be able to access their own information online, and share it with family physicians or other health partners in the community.

SMALL CHANGES, BIG IMPACT

CHEO has started to adopt "Lean" practices in several areas of the hospital, including the 4 North, 4 East and 4 West inpatient units. The Lean approach was perfected in the manufacturing industry and adopted more recently by leaders in the health sector to improve care and streamline workflow

We have been enabling staff to devise sustainable solutions to everyday issues that stand in our way – and to ultimately enhance the patient experience. Quality improvement "tickets" are one important tool. These tickets flag something on the unit that needs fixing and can be submitted by anyone (including parents and patients). For example, a parent posted a ticket regarding the lack of hangers in the closets, forcing families to use wall hooks meant for medical teams and equipment. One of our nurses took charge and arranged for hangers – and the all-important cleaning of hangers! Simple change, yes but with hundreds of tickets successfully completed this year they have a combined impact. The results? On 4 North, for instance, the average length of stay has successfully decreased and the quality and safety indicators have increased. When families were asked if they could "feel" a difference, there was a resounding "YES!"

THE RE-CREATION OF 4 NORTH

Thanks to the generous donations of our amazing community, our 4 North unit has been renovated becoming a more colorful

child-friendly, and welcoming place. This is especially important because a well-designed environment can help lighten the load for our parents and promote faster healing for our patients.

CONNECTING CARE FOR OUR MOST FRAGILE PATIENTS

In November, our neonatal transport team received \$3.1 million from the Ontario government to transport newborns from across northeastern, southeastern and eastern Ontario. This allows us to provide our most fragile patients with exceptional care and be more available to respond to life-threatening emergencies. CHEO's care changes young lives in our region and beyond – nowhere is that more evident than on the ambulances and helicopters that carry our teams of dedicated professionals who give these infants the best possible start in life, improving their lifelong health and reducing long-term costs for the health care system.

OUR INNOVATION CHANGES YOUNG LIVES AROUND THE WORLD

To help families make difficult decisions, CHEO published the first comprehensive electronic library of pediatric patient decision aids in the world. Patient decision aids are standardized, evidenced-based tools which help families become more involved in decision making. They enable better information sharing between families and the health care team, create more realistic expectations and a better match between families' preferences and treatment choices.

TOMORROW STARTS HERE

Twenty years from now, there will be approximately 70,000 more kids in our community than there are today, stretching our already-limited resources so it is important that CHEO continue to innovate.


CHEO RESEARCH INSTITUTE CEO MESSAGE

One might say that Ottawa's best kept secret is the incredible momentum behind the CHEO Research Institute, but rather I think the best kept secret is that research happens everywhere at CHEO. This past year we've hosted many donor tours of our traditional labs but really, almost all physicians, allied health professionals, nurses and staff either conduct or support research at CHEO. We have an incredible team that's dedicated to making discoveries today for healthier kids tomorrow, because children are our future.



I'd categorize our discoveries into two camps – both equally important – on one hand, discoveries that make an immediate impact by transforming health care; and on the other hand, discoveries that promise to make a significant impact on serious childhood diseases in the future.

Our clinical researchers are driven to solve problems they see everyday. Take for example, Dr. Donna Johnston in the oncology division. She was concerned that kids undergoing chemotherapy often have a decreased appetite, which can greatly impact their response to treatment. So, she is proactively leading a nationwide study to test whether a hormone found naturally in the body might stimulate appetite in cancer patients. She wants to make a measurable difference in cancer care.

We've had so many home runs in 2013 that make an immediate impact on health outcomes. For instance, Dr. Stuart Harman and team discovered that a topical analgesic cream gives kids a pain free experience when using skin glue to repair cuts, and now this is standard treatment in CHEO's Emergency department. Dr. Robert Klaassen discovered how to measure the quality of life for kids suffering with a rare blood condition, and now CHEO will use this tool to help optimize their health care. Dr. Travis Saunders in our Healthy Active Living and Obesity research group discovered that frequent breaks in sedentary behavior makes kids healthier. Dr. Benchimol proved that the flu vaccine is safe for patients with inflammatory bowel disease; the list goes on. Research at CHEO changes health outcomes at the bed side - today.

In the future, research from our esteemed scientists in CHEO's labs will impact the way therapies are developed to treat a variety of pediatric ailments including rare genetic diseases, cancer, and diabetes. For instance, Dr. Robert Korneluk and team discovered that combining two experimental immunotherapies kills tumours more accurately and rapidly than either agent on its own. Drs. Kym Boycott and Alex MacKenzie have identified more than 66 novel rare disease genes to date, and now as part of the CARE for RARE research program they are already developing and testing eight potential new treatments for rare diseases like spinal muscular atrophy and myotonic dystrophy.

Dr. Robert Screaton is investigating a pathway that could improve the insulin producing function of beta cells in patients with early diabetes. Our scientists attract trainees from across North America because the depth and breadth of bench science at CHEO receives international acclaim.

According to Research Infosource, we have been the fastest growing hospital-based research institute in Canada over the last three years and the third-ranked pediatric research hospital in Canada! Much of our success has come from the hardworking commitment of our researchers, trainees, staff and volunteers. But I want to give a special nod to the community at large as this success would not have been possible without your generous support. Your unwavering belief in research at CHEO makes us unstoppable. We will continue to change young lives today – and in the future.

STATEMENT OF MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The accompanying financial statements of the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario Foundation are the responsibility of management. These financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook – Accounting Standards for not-for-profit Organizations, which sets out generally accepted accounting principles ["GAAP"] for not-for-profit organizations in Canada.

The Foundation maintains systems of internal accounting and administrative controls of high quality, consistent with reasonable cost. Such systems are designed to provide reasonable assurance that the financial information is relevant, reliable, accurate, and complete, in all material respects, and that the Foundation's assets are appropriately accounted for and adequately safeguarded.

The Board of Directors is responsible for ensuring that management fulfills its responsibilities for financial reporting and is ultimately responsible for reviewing and approving the financial statements. The Board carries out this responsibility principally through its Finance Committee, whose members are appointed by the Board.

The Finance Committee meets with management and the external auditors to discuss internal controls over the financial reporting process, auditing matters and financial reporting issues, and to satisfy itself that each party is properly discharging its responsibilities. The Finance Committee reports its findings to the Board for consideration when approving the financial statements for issuance to the members in the Annual Report.

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
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
